If you did not read the title of this article, do it now and then resume reading. So what did you think when you read it? Did you first think of X-ray, CT Scan, MRI or some other procedure that is part of the medical world? It might surprise you that the Bible itself uses the phrase "inward parts."

spoke. He described the true nature of Christianity. "This shall be the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel; after those days, saith the Lord, I will beginning on the put my law in their inward parts, and write it in their hearts; and will be their God, and they shall be my

people." God was planning on putting His laws in man's inward parts. The Hebrew word for "inward part" indicates the central part of man, and the New Testament quotes this Old Testament verse and uses the phrase "into their minds" (Heb. 8:10).

The words "inward parts" (or mind) and the word "heart" which follows them probably reflect Hebrew parallelism, but there is a blessing if we look more carefully at the contrast between putting "My laws in their minds" and writing "them in their hearts." God seems to make a distinction between minds and hearts in this passage. There is a distinct difference in the mind and the heart.

Christianity first involves the law of God and the mind of man. Before His words truly become part of our spiritual lives, we must use our minds to know His laws. We listen to His words or read them in the Bible, and we are "...taught by God" and are "...drawn to Him" (John 6:44-45). We know His laws because we have put them in our minds.

> However, if we stop at this point, our relationship with Him has just begun and being transformed into His image will never happen. Our inward part, our soul, must be involved. To use Paul's words, "We all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord" (2 Cor. 3:18).

We come to His word with open hearts and unveiled faces and see His image. That image is a mirror in which we see His glory, but we also see ourselves. We see Him, but our souls see ourselves. By spending time looking at Him, His image is written on our hearts and our glory becomes like His glory. These words vividly describe how the Holy Spirit changes us. God's Spirit changes us to be like God, but it never happens without using His mirror to write His words first in our minds and then in our souls. So how do you look in your inside?

I'm OK, You're OK?

In 1967, Thomas A. Harris published a book entitled, I'm OK, You're OK. The book focused on interpersonal relationships, healthy communication and understanding how individuals interact with one another. Harris did not focus on religious beliefs, but the title of his book has certainly been taken

and used frequently in that arena for over 50 years.

When a difference in beliefs and/or teachings about the Bible has arisen, some have tried to argue that such differences are immaterial and want to conclude, "I'm ok, you're ok." But, when it comes to the truths of the Word of God, can we take such er phrase) to "agree to disagree"? Let's consider just a few examples.

If two religious groups teach two different paths to salvation from sin, is one "ok" and the other also "ok"? God clearly teaches us to not add to His Word, nor take away from it (Rev. 22:18-19). We are warned about "anyone" teaching "any other gospel" than what is plainly found in Scripture (Gal. 1:9). We are commanded to "all speak the same thing" and to have "no divisions" among us (1 Cor. 1:10). We are cautioned against merely thinking that we are right with the Lord, when we have not actually been obeying Him (Matt. 7:21-23).

So, back to the question—If two religious groups teach two different paths to salvation from sin, is one "ok" and the other also "ok"? Let's be more specific—if one group teaches that salvation is by faith alone but another group teaches that salvation is not by faith alone, are they both "ok"? If one group teaches that baptism is essential for salvation but another group teaches that baptism is not essential for salvation, are they both "ok"? If one group teaches that a Christian

> can fall away from his saved state and be lost but another group teaches that once a person is saved that he is always saved, are they both "ok"?

It is obvious that saying two opposite things cannot both be right or "ok." Why would anyone an approach? Is it permissible to God (to use anoth- can we take such "agree to disagree" when the Bible makes matters of salvation so clear? The Bible teaches that one is saved by faith (John 3:16), but it does not teach that

> one is saved by faith alone (John 3:36; 8:30-44; Jas. 2:14-26). The Bible teaches that baptism of a penitent believer is essential for sins to be forgiven by Christ (Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; 22:16; 1 Pet. 3:21). The Bible teaches that once a person is saved that he can so live that he falls away from his saved state and is lost (Jas. 5:19-20; 2 Pet. 2:20-22; Gal. 5:1-4). Thank God for the clarity of His Word!

> Disagreements over religious beliefs cannot be settled by "I'm ok, you're ok." They must be settled by Scripture!

Does your media exemplify godly nobility or choices for what is your TikTok delivering trash?

Does your media promote justice or are your "Shorts" showing you something else?

Does your media teach purity, loveliness, goodness, virtue and that which receives God's praise or is your search history something you hope is never seen?

Evil thoughts war against the soul! We can't go on being inundated with the ugliness of the world 24/7. We need to make better choices for what gets our attention. Let's make a real effort to put worldly media away and concentrate on those things that God has given us. Despite all the turmoil in the world, if we will turn our minds to God and His teachings, "...the God of peace will be with you" (Phil. 4:9).

SIMPLE Things You Can Do to Build Personal FAITH in YOUR KIDS

1. Pray together in the morning before school.

- 2. Pray together before every meal.
- 3. Pray together before going to bed every night.
- 4. Stop everything and read a Bible story together every night before bed.
- Read Bible stories to them from the time they are in the womb and even while very young.
- 6. Listen to a chapter in Proverbs each morning corresponding to the day of the month.
- 7. Read and study the Bible (as part of your day) in front of your kids, so they can see it's important to you.
- 8. Give your kids age-appropriate Bible books every year to build their own library.
- 9. Commemorate the date of their baptism each year, emphasizing its supreme importance.
- 10. Create and take advantage of teachable moments about God—His power, His love, His will.
- 11. Make Bible class and worship attendance an absolute, consistent, #1 priority for your family.
- 12. Refuse to allow any worldly affairs (ex: sports, school events, work, etc.) to interfere with worship time.
- 13. Have your kids involved in worship from very young (giving, praying, singing, sermon notes, etc.).
- 14. Find and worship with faithful congregations when traveling.
- 15. Talk about what they learned in Bible class every Sunday and every Wednesday.
- 16. Be highly involved in church activities beyond classes and worship.
- 17. Find various ways that you can serve in the church and involve your children with you.
- 18. Have them around other Christians frequently outside of the church building.
- 19. Speak of church members as if they are members of your family and make heroes out of them.
- 20. Make your home the hangout place where church friends are always welcome, even without asking.
- 21. Refuse to ever talk negatively about the church or about people in the church (including its leaders).
- 22. Engage your kids in simple service projects for elderly, hurting or special members of the church.
- 23. Encourage your kids to invite their friends and others to church.
- 24. Make the church (as a collective and as individual members) a natural, everyday part of your home.
- 25. Teach your kids the overwhelming evidence for the existence of God and of His creation.
- 26. Teach your kids that the Bible is truly from God and has God's truth for everything we need to know.
- 27. Teach your kids that Jesus loves them, died for them and wants to be their best friend.
- 28. Teach your kids to love the unique nature of the church of Christ.
- 29. Listen to worship songs and children's Bible class songs in the car.
- 30. Play Bible trivia type games in the car on road trips.
- 31. Subscribe to Discovery Magazine from Apologetics Press.
- 32. Let them know specific ways in which God has taken care of you and the family over the years.
- 33. Speak of the commands of God as desires we want to do and not as drudgeries or burdens.
- 34. Talk about the hard subjects of Christian morality, emphasizing a desire to please God above all else.
- 35. Control immorality that comes into your home, including phones, TV shows, movies, music, etc.
- 36. Schedule fun family activities in place of school activities that are inconsistent with Christian values.
- 37. Live the Christian life in front of them every day, without shame or compromise.
- 38. Treat everyone in the home with respect—in words, attitudes and actions—even when it's hard.
- 39. Build a strong marriage and let your kids see parents who love each other and serve each other.
- 40. Treat your kids as responsible human beings, created in the image of God to bring Him glory in all things.




